Q What is your full name? A Robert M. Manley

Q Tour residence address?

Q The telephone? A

Q What is your business address?

I am down have

all the time in this territory, but the company is there.

A No, telephone service.

Q of course as you know, you have been completely eliminated as a suspect in this case by the Police Department.
A That's what I thought, yes.

Q We are here to see if you can help us in any way by trying to remember some of the conversations you had with Beth Short at the time three years ago, when you were riding around in the car with her and talking with her. The first time you met her, I believe you picked her up on a street corner in San Diego. A Uh-huh.

O If you can, relate more of the conversations you had with her. To you it may seem unimportant, but anything that she might have said, particularly relative to boy friends, or anybody she might have mentioned, for instance, doctors' names, if she mentioned any at any time. But if you can, try to relate -- when you first met her and picked her up on the street corner -- relate everything she said, as near as you can remember. Do you know everything she said?

A Well, gosh, everything like that was taken down in the statement I gave to the Police Department when they called me in.

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I told them everything I sould think of. She didn't mention enybody's mane she had been out with or any doctors, or she sidn't mention enybody. The only thing that happened that seemed a little funny to me, on the way in to Los Angeles, she kept turning her head and looked out of the window -- looked at sars we passed or that passed us, on the highway. I thought maybe she was watching for someone that might be following her up from San Diego or semething.

- Q She made a telephone call there, in San Diego, just before the left to come to Los Angeles. Did she use a pay telephone? A No. I did.
- Q You did! A Yes, I salled my wife from Sen Diego.

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- Q Well, she did make some telephone cells, didn't she? Didn't you see her make several telephone cells? A No. not once
- In other words, any calls she might have made to enyone from the motel, you didn't see her make those?

 A No, that's right. I was out working after I left the motel and when I had made my calls I picked her up and I made a few calls in the way in, coming back to los Angeles. As far as I knew she was just sitting there in the car waiting until I came back from my calls. She could have made calls and gotten back to the car before I came out of those offices but I don't know if she did.
- Q It seems from investigation she did make a lot of telephone calls. I think you would remember if she made any telephone calls that you saw? Did you see her make any?

 A Not one, while I was with her.
- Q Did she ever say at any time she would like to get in touch with someone and wanted to make a telephone call?

 A No, she never did. She told me she was going to much her sister from Berkeley at the Biltmore Hotel.
- Q What was the name of her mister, the name she gave you? A live forgotten. It's been so long. I don't even know if she did mention her name. She just said her sistory that's all she did mention; that she thought she would spend some time with her sister and then go home to Boston... The did say that, That's the only thing.
- Q Marcate to Los ingeles, when she was telling you she wanted to go to the Diltmore Hotel, did she ever say you could make it someplace else, or was it always the Diltmore Hotel?

A Well, I maked her when we were coming to Los Angeles, I maked her where to take her and she said she wanted to meet her sister at the Biltmore Hotel. She got the idea of checking her baggage at the Greyhound.

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Q What did she say about that? A Well, she just said -- I don't remember exactly -- I know it was her idea to stop at the Greyhoudd and check her baggage.

Q Did she give you any reason for that? Was she going back up north?

A well, it weems like she did give some reason at the time -her sister might not be there right away and she didn't want
to have that baggage there, or something, at the hotel. I
believe that was it, and then she was satisfied for me to just
leave her right there but I didn't go for that. She led me to
believe she hadn't been in los Angeles before and I told her
it was a bad part of town and I better take her to the Biltmore
and I told her to stay wasy from that part of town.

- Q Well, did she say her sister was staying at the Biltmore? A No, she was going to must her there.
- Q In other words, she had plens all the time to go to the Biltmore Hotel? She told you, at least, that her sister was going to be there and meet her, is that right? A That's right and she went to the rest room there to get kind of straightened up for the trip and I went down and inquired at the desk if her mister had checked in but they didn't have suybody registered under that name.
- Q Was the name Mrs. Adrian West? A Yes, that was it -- West -- That's right.
- Q That's what she told you? A. That's right.
- Q Buring the course of your conversations with her, during that five or six hours when you were coming to los Angeles, did she speak about how she liked to go denoing or that she liked to go denoing?

A Oh yes, she liked to dence, alright. Things we talked about were so unimportant, I don't even remember them. She didn't talk much on the way in. I don't know if she was worried about something or what,

- Q Did she say she felt bad? A She didn't feel good. She told me so that night at the motel.
- Q Do you think she didn't feel well all the way up here? A I don't think she did feel well. That's my impression, after what she told me.

- Q Did she mention ever doing any contest ballroom danging -anything like that?
- Q Bid she ever mention any dancing partners? A. No.
- Q Anybody she liked to dance with? Nö.
- Q And she led you to believe she had never been in Los Angeles before, is that right? A That's right.
- Q The next morning there after the one -- before you started for Los Angeles, on the morning of the 9th of January, 1947, did she mention that she had been taking some shots, or any kind of medicine for her health? A No. she didn't say a thing about that.
- Q Fust what did she say about her condition -- how she felt? A Well, she didn't even care to have me do much talking after we got back to the room, after we had been denoing. She just took a blanket off of the bed, propped her legs up against the wall by the heater and I asked her what was the matter with her and she said she just didn't feel well and for me to leave her alone so I did, and she didn't talk much more after that.
- Q Did you see her writing any letters that night? A No. she didn't write any as far as I know.
- Q. What did she may about her health? Did she say she had a headacher or a teeth acher A She said it was just that time of the month and she wanted to be left alone,
- Q She didn't say if she had a tooth ache or a head ache? A No, she just led me to believe she was having a mensturation period -- that was all.
- Q What would you say most of the conversation was about? About danoing -- going places? A Well, she liked to have a good time. I guess.
- Q Well, as near as you can remember -- of course its difficult. I know -- but as near as you can remember, what were some of the things she said, regardless of what it was -- just what she said? Did she mention her mother? A No, its so hard to remember after all this time, the things she said. Gosh, what we talked about were just minor things

a parson wouldn't think about, just carrying conversation along.

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Q Did she tell you she owns from Massachusetta? Tou, from Bouten. A. No. Q Did the mention her mother at the & Her Amily's Well, she mentioned going back home to Boston agter a winth with her ninter-Did the tell you the case from a worr fine family or anything like that? A No. who didn't mention enthine about this. Q what did she say about her sister, outside or the fact who wented to meat her at the Billingree? That was all she said shout her sister. Q Top are positive, are you, that she didn't nake any telephone calls on the 9th of January? A I didn't see her make any, as tar as I know, yes, I wish I sould help you more. I went to get this squared off. It looks like a new Grand Jury. Q Well, of course, your mass probably won't come up at any A Of ecurse. I realize they haven't found anything to go on. Q That's why we are here today, in the hope that maybe you would remember something that to you would be insignificant and of me value, but to us it might mean something, A Maye you my statement that I made before? Q Yes. In there we found very little as to actual conversetion. Well, is must have been the usual thing -- unimportant things that would just go in one ear and out of the other. Things I wouldn't remember. She had that little notebook --mo, address book, Q Did she tall you have she got down to San Disgoy A No. I don't remember her saying non she got down there. Q What did she tall you shout her profession? That did she do for a living? A well, she did say something about that. Said she worked -lets see - in the mirport or some transport lines, or something, in the office. seasic that the continue to you to meet her at that place. didn't she, and she didn't show up, in San Diago, where she tanianos ed or besogges see

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A Tem, it means like it to me.

Q What did she may when you finally met her ofter she failed to keep the appointment? What did she may about it? Thy wasn't she there?

A I don't remarbar.

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Q Did this girl in San Diego where she stayed have a brother? Offices Brown: Yes, a kid about 16 years old -- Gary.

Q Gary Franck? A CYPICER BROWN: Un-bul.

MR. MANIEY: It seems she went into town with bin or something, or with the sister.

Q Did she continue to lead you to believe she was working at the transportation company? A Tes, as far as I know. I rigured when she didn't keep the appointment that she was working and I saked two or three people and they didn't know her and I didn't think she worked there then.

What we want to know is snything she told you lies? What did she say about this job when she left Sen Diego? Did she sention she quit the job?

A I believe she did. I wouldn't swear to it, no, but I believe she did say she quit the job and wented to know if I would take her to Los angeles to visit her sister.

- Q Did she talk sensthing about well, having a party I mean, about the sex loss?

 A No. she was very sold.
- Q She didn't even talk about it. She was very cold, as for as I was concerted.

 A No. in fact, she talked very little on the way in to los Angeles and I wasn't in a very talkative mood. I don't know what was the matter with her. It didn't make any difference to me. I was just glad to get rid of her.
- Q I wish you could remember some of the things she did. It might help to bring these conversations back to you. Moroute, did she want to stop at any service station and go to the rest worm at any time during that time?

I imagine. I remember it was a little late — I remember that, because I told the lady in the motel it was a little late and that's when she began looking back at care.

Q In other words, to the best of your memory, previous to that time, she didn't seem bothered about automobiles, but after leaving the motel was when she began looking at care?

It was getting late in the afternoon and we stopped at Laguna Beach, I imagine, around 5:00 or 5:30, I don't know exactly.
